Conservation Lands

In 2015, the CCCA focused its efforts on initiatives that promoted habitat restoration and improved accessibility on lands owned and managed by the Conservation Authority. Thanks to the generous financial support from 10 different government agencies and community partners, the following projects were realized...

• 8 hectares of marginal farmland at the Yarmouth Natural Heritage Area (YNHA)

- Approximately 100 metres of eroded streambank was stabilized and rehabilitated at the Archie Coulter Conservation Area (ACCA) and the YNHA
- 10 kilometres of walking trails were restored at the ACCA, the YNHA, and the Springwater Forest to keep them accessible and safe for the public to enjoy
- Work to improve the public washroom facilities at the Springwater Conservation Area was initiated thanks to the Federal Enabling Accessibility Fund
