- Attended Conservation Ontario's Annual General Meeting. Details were highlighted in Report FA 24/2023.
- Completed the CCCA Source Protection Authority, details were provided in Reports
- SPA 01/2023, SPA 02/2023, SPA 03/2023, SPA 04/ 2023.
- Attended a General Managers meeting to discuss Ontario's next steps to support housing supply growth. Of interest to Conservation Authorities is talk of freezing 74 different provincial fees at the 2023-2024 level which is yet to be determined. This includes fees that directly or indirectly increase the cost of housing. They also claim the approval processes will be expedited by updating the Provincial Policy Statement, 2020 and integrating it with A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe to create a single, province wide, housing-focused land use planning policy document.
- Continual work on the Tisdale Conservation Area Eco Gift designation. The property
  has been deemed ecologically sensitive and we have moved forward providing letters
  patent from Windon Farms, maps and aerial imagery of the Tisdale CA in geographical
  reference to all of the other conservation areas within ten kilometers. We received the
  official certificate of ecological sensitivity on March 20, 2023. The CCCA has submitted
  a narrative appraisal report prepared by Valco Real Estate Appraisers and Consultants
  and staff are awaiting to hear next steps from the review committee.
- Secured 20 mature 50mm-60mm Sycamore Trees and Tulip Trees to replace dead or declining trees at the Memorial Path of Honor. The Memorial Path of Honor receives a tree every time a Police Officer falls in the line of duty. The CCCA and OPC have had an ongoing community partnership in regards to the Path of Honor for many years. A general maintenance day has been scheduled for May 24, and members are welcome to attend if they so wish.
- Met with Andrew Gunn, Donnie Ivey, and AI our Conservation Areas Supervisor to discuss the stage grand opening which is scheduled to be held on June 22, 2023.
- Prepared for and completed the Source Protection Authority and Full Authority Agenda packages
- Completed the Year End Transfer Payment Section 39 Reporting requirements.
- Attended an online General Managers Meeting to discuss approaches regulatory requirements for levy apportionment, voting methods and processes.
- Hosted a Board Orientation for new members where the Administrative By Law, expectations and duties/ roles and responsibilities were discussed.
- Review of the Indigenous and Public Consultation Toolkits made by Conservation
   Ontario. It is a requirement to engage indigenous groups and the watershed

- Verify that all required boating safety equipment is on board
- · Monitor boating activities
- Etc.

Law enforcement officers have the power to hand out fines on the spot to those who disregard boating safety regulations.

#### PURPOSE:

To consider sending a delegate(s) to the A.D. Latornell Conservation Symposium.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The 2023 Annual A.D. Latornell Conservation Symposium theme is Changing Climates: Our Watershed Moment.

A watershed moment is the exact moment that changed the direction of an important historical event. There is a period before and a period after. Watershed moments are fascinating because they are often recognized in hindsight.

This year, the Latornell Conservation Symposium challenges conservation professionals to consider, "Is this our Watershed Moment?" We are working in ever-changing environmental, political, social, and economic climates. Were experiencing the impacts of climate change and subsequent impacts on our watersheds. Recent legislative changes have worsened the perception that development and the environment are at odds. This conflict will have tangible effects on the land and water and the consequences of those effects will be felt for decades. A global economic slowdown and political instability mean fewer funds, and the environment is often sacrificed for basic needs and economic drivers. Watershed moments are often marked by immense change and apprehension about what's next. But they are also times of great inspiration, renewal, and rebirth. People and organizations often emerge stronger and more resilient.

The A.D. Latornell Conservation Symposium return to the Royal Botanical Gardens in Burlington for our one-and-a-half-day in-person event from Monday, October 23-Tuesday, October 24, 2023. A mix of field trips and workshops will occur on the Monday afternoon, with a full day of technical sessions on Tuesday. Several webinars throughout the Fall will be conducted to connect with the broader conservation community across Ontario.

The cost of the 1.5-day registration package is only \$225. A limited number of spots will be available in September and are subject to availability.

**SUBJECT:** Provincial Offences Officer Appointment

**DATE:** March 03, 2023

#### **PURPOSE:**

To appoint the Conservation Lands Supervisor as a Provincial Offences Officer with the primary purpose of regulating or prohibiting activities on CCCA property.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

CCCA is responsible for enforcing regulations under Sections 28 and 29 of the Conservation Authorities Act. The legislation enables CCCA to appoint provincial offences officers for this purpose.

The Section 28 regulation is in place to regulate or prohibit development, interference with wetlands and alterations to shorelines and watercourses. For example, placing soil or rock fill along a shoreline or streambank is a regulated activity. Compliance and enforcement tasks for the Section 28 (development) regulation are addressed by CCCA staff, in particular the Resource Planning Coordinator. The Section 29 regulation is in place to regulate or prohibit activities on CCCA property. For example, starting a campfire at a conservation area is a regulated activity. The Section 29 (property) regulation is administered by CCCA staff. CCCA maintains Provincial Offences Officers on staff to perform compliance and enforcement duties under Section 28 and 29 of the Conservation Authorities Act. There is a need to appoint an additional officer at this time.

Albert Bradford is employed by the CCCA as the Conservation Areas Supervisor. In February 2023, Mr. Bradford successfully completed the Conservation Authority Compliance Training Level 1 course, which is an intensive training opportunity specifically provided to Conservation Authority staff who wish to be appointed as a Provincial Offences Officer. In addition, a Canadian Police Certificate has been obtained for Mr. Bradford with no issues identified.

Mr. Bradford is primarily responsible for ensuring compliance and enforcing the Section 29 regulations, however he may also be called upon to assist with ensuring compliance and enforcing the Section 28 regulation (Ontario Regulation 146/06: Development, Interference with Wetlands & Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses).

#### **RECCOMENDATION:**

THAT Albert Bradford be appointed as a Provincial Offences Officer #104 under Sections 28 and 29 of the Conservation Authorities Act.

**SUBJECT:** Develop to Marketing Grant Program through Ontario's Southwest

**DATE:** May 25, 2023

#### PURPOSE:

To provide board members with the Develop to Marketing Grant Program performance metrics

#### DISCUSSION:

In January, Ontario's Southwest offered a program called Develop to Marketing which offered a \$1000.00 credit towards photography, advertising or marketing through Ontario's Southwest. Catfish Creek Conservation Authority was able to secure a spot in the program. Staff thought it was best to utilize advertising for transient camping and day use facilities.

During the month of April, Ontario's Southwest marketing team compiled a media campaign for Springwater Conservation Area.

On Facebook and Instagram, advertisement videos for Springwater Conservation Area were posted onto Ontario's Southwest Facebook and Instagram pages. The posts generated an 11, 616 reach, 317 clicks, 27,154 impressions (number of times ads were displayed) and with a click through rate of 2.54.Our click through rate was 182% above the industry average campaigns. Facebooks average click through rate (CTR) is 0.90% - Source Wordstream 2022.

Ontario's Southwest also did a newsletter spotlight on Springwater Conservation Area in the month of April. The newsletter saw 153 clicks to our website link, and had a 39,98% open rate with 27,225 people opened and viewed the email. Ontario's Southwest also noted that Springwater Conservation Areas newsletter email was one of the most clicked in the entire email blast.

Since the media campaign through the Develop to Marketing Grant Program, we have noticed an increase in new transient campers (those who have not camped with us before) and new transient campers from as far as the Greater Toronto Area.



# ANNUAL REPORT



#### **PROGRAM BACKGROUND**

The Elgin Clean Water Program (ECWP) was initiated in 2012 as a collaboration between the four conservation authorities (CAs) within Elgin County: Catfish Creek CA, Kettle Creek CA, Long Point Region CA and Lower Thames Valley CA. The ECWP provides the necessary technical expertise and financial incentives for landowners that are interested in implementing environmental projects.

A Review Committee oversees the program and reviews and approves projects. The Review Committee is comprised of representatives from Elgin County, the Elgin Soil and Crop Improvement Association, the Elgin Federation of Agriculture and an Elgin County landowner.

The following project categories are funded by the Elgin Clean Water Program:


- Well Management
- Erosion Control Structures
- Clean Water Diversion

- Wetland/Riparian Protection/ Restoration
- Livestock Management

In addition, a Cover Crop Incentive Program was established in 2017 which provides an incentive for farmers to plant cover crops on their farm in an effort to provide erosion control on agricultural fields over the winter months.

#### **PROGRAM SUCCESS**

To date, 290 projects have been completed across Elgin County since the program began in 2012. Total project costs have exceeded \$3,370,000. The ECWP has contributed \$793,905 in grants to landowners to undertake projects. CA staff have assisted landowners in leveraging the ECWP funding to obtain \$1,533,535 in matching funds and landowners have contributed \$1,042,282 of their own funds, labour and equipment.



#### **2022 PROGRAM SUMMARY**

In 2022, 26 projects were completed, totalling \$68,608.19 in ECWP grants.

The breakdown of completed projects was as follows:

- 2 Erosion Control
- 1 Wellhead Protection
- 12 Wetland Creation
- 3 Tallgrass Prairie Establishment
- 8 Cover Crop

#### **PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS**

#### **Wetland Creation**

Wetland creation projects continued to be the most funded project category in 2022 with 12 projects completed. This wetland creation project saw the retirement of 2 acres of marginal farmland to create a wetland in a wet area of the field. In addition, 1,900 native tree and shrub seedlings were planted.









#### **Erosion Control**

Five Water and Sediment Control Basins (WASCoBs) were installed to slow the movement of surface water across the farm. Two of the structures built adjacent to the woodlot incorporated larger sediment control basins to allow for a larger amount of surface water to be captured, while also adding wildlife habitat.





#### **Wellhead Protection**

The existing well was located inside a pumphouse structure four feet below grade. A licensed well contractor extended the well casing above grade and installed a pitless adapter.





#### **Tallgrass Prairie Planting**

Tallgrass prairie was established at this 1.5 acre parcel of marginal farmland. The landowner was interested in diversifying habitat types on the property. A mix of wildflowers and native grasses were planted including Big bluestem, Switchgrass, Wild bergamot, Grey-headed coneflower and Sullivant's milkweed.

# Port Bruce Flood Attenuation Proposal Bordered by Hale Street, Colin Street, Lindley Street and Imperial Road

#### Introduction

As a component of the Conservation Authorities Act, Ontario Regulation 686/21, Mandatory Programs and Services, the Catfish Creek Conservation Authority (CCCA) delivers its responsibilities as outlined in legislation to its member municipality's for Flood Forecasting and Warning (FFW) along with Ice Management as compiled below.

#### Flood forecasting and warning

- 2. (1) An authority shall provide programs and services to support its functions and responsibilities related to flood forecasting and warning as set out in subsection (2).
- (2) The authority's functions and responsibilities with respect to flood forecasting and warning mentioned in subsection (1) are the following:
  - Maintaining information on surface water hydrology and the areas within the authority's area
    of jurisdiction that are vulnerable to flooding events.
  - Developing operating procedures for flood forecasting and warning, including flood contingency procedures to ensure continuity of an authority's operations in respect of flood forecasting and warning.
  - Maintaining a stream flow monitoring network that, at a minimum, includes stream flow gauges available as part of the provincial-federal hydrometric network and, where the authority considers it advisable, includes additional local stream flow gauges.
  - 4. Monitoring of weather and climate information, snow surveys and observed water levels and flows utilizing local, provincial and federal data sources.
  - Analysis of local surface water hydrologic conditions related to flood potential and risk, including flood forecasting, to understand and quantify the response and potential impacts within watersheds to specific events and conditions.
  - 6. Communications to inform persons and bodies that the authority considers advisable of the potential or actual impact of flood events in a timely manner.
  - 7. Provision of ongoing information and advice to persons and bodies mentioned in paragraph 6 to support,
    - i. emergency and flood operations during a flood event, and
    - ii. documentation of flood events.

#### Ice management

- **4.** (1) An authority shall provide programs and services for ice management within its area of jurisdiction, if the authority determines that ice management is necessary to reduce the risks associated with natural hazards referred to in subsection 1 (1).
- (2) Programs or services provided under subsection (1) shall include the development and implementation of an ice management plan on or before December 31, 2024 that identifies,
  - (a) how ice within the authority's area of jurisdiction may increase the risk of natural hazards; and
  - (b) the steps that are necessary to mitigate these risks, including identifying equipment and resources needed to carry out these steps.
- (3) An authority may update the ice management plan referred to in subsection (2) from time to time as the authority considers it advisable

As outlined, CCCA is responsible for natural hazard items such as FFW and Ice Management, of which the following is a component section 4. (b) the steps that are necessary to mitigate these risks, including identifying equipment and resources needed to carry out these steps, "if the authority determines that ice management is necessary to reduce the risks associated with natural hazards" (Ice Management 4.1). CCCA acknowledges that ice management is vital in Port Bruce to reduce the risks associated with flooding.

The three flood attenuation proposals outlined in this report are intended to suggest "steps that are necessary to mitigate these risks, including identifying equipment and resources needed to carry out these steps" (Conservation Authorities Act, Ontario Regulation 686/21, Mandatory Programs and Services, Section 4. (b))

## Background

A Flood Warning Plan for the Catfish Creek watershed has been compiled, and is presently under annual review, to provide up to date systematic procedures for CCCA staff to consult during flood emergencies. Specific emphasis is placed on areas of the watershed, which are largely susceptible to flooding; the Hamlet of Port Bruce is one of six such identified flood prone areas within the Catfish Creek watershed.

Flooding in any area is not limited to spring freshet and ice breakup/jamming conditions. It can occur at any time when there are adverse weather conditions associated with extreme precipitation patterns. Historically, flooding within the Hamlet of Port Bruce has only been associated with spring freshet and ice breakup conditions which in turn cause ice jamming and subsequent flooding.

Ice jam mitigation is an integral component of the CCCA Flood Management Plan. "While ice jams may be relatively common at a given site, they cannot be predicted with certainty in any given year." Department of the Army, United States Army Corps of Engineers, <u>EM 1110-2-1612</u> Manual.

At present, CCCA uses the following measures and methods combined with the Flood Management Plan to assist with ice jam mitigation:

 The removal of all seasonal docks, support structures and any other possible obstructions from the waters of Catfish Creek, flood plain and municipal park areas by mid November.

This request is intended to assist in reducing potential impacts of in channel ice build-up and associated flooding. Leaving obstructions in the channel may accelerate ice build-up and consequently adversely influence the movement of in channel ice through Port Bruce.


Channel flow patterns around obstructions may also accelerate creek-bank erosion during high run-off periods. Boat docks dislodged due to flooding or ice jam events can pose a serious safety threat to the public. In addition, all other floatable objects such as; picnic tables, propane tanks, barrels, etc. need to be removed from or secured within flood prone areas.

- Sounding, has been reinstated and is carried out yearly in the spring and fall.
  Bathymetric analysis is prepared using these sounding results and are compared to
  historic soundings. The sounding outcomes are presented to the CCCA Board for
  information purposes. When required and applicable the information is used as a
  channel assessment tool for ice mitigation.
- Ice Monitoring, has been reinstated when conditions permit, during ice melt and subsequent break-up. Ice is monitored at four locations along the lower Catfish Creek reach, and inspected whenever deemed safe and necessary, to ensure up to date flow and ice break-up information/conditions to assess possible ice jam circumstances. The program is designed to sample channel ice quality and quantity, which may have the potential to cause ice jams and associated flooding in Port Bruce.
- Controlled Ice Hole Drilling, reinstated conditions permitting. Holes are drilled trough the
  ice cover in a systematic pattern to reduce ice integrity intended to limit/mitigate ice jam
  formations. CCCA uses an ice auger to drill holes at a time that will minimize hole
  freeze-back and allow channel flows to further weaken the ice cover through hydraulic
  vortex erosion/melting during spring freshet and ice melts.
- Ice Breaking/Ice Removal using a dragline at the Port Bruce Harbour is carried out as an advance measure to help mitigate ice jamming within the Hamlet of Port Bruce as well as a countermeasure to breakup existing jams within the harbour area. Ice breaking is carried out at a time when weather patterns are conducive to spring freshet and ice integrity degradation. The intention is that the remaining in channel ice cover will be flushed out to the lake by the spring freshet, thereby minimizing an opportunity for ice jam formations within the Hamlet of Port Bruce. In some instances, simply breaking the ice cover is not sufficient, and is often accompanied by continuous ice clearing and dispersal within the harbour area during in channel ice migration. CCCA recommendation: minimum reach of a 100-foot boom and 2-yard bucket.

CCCA's above-mentioned historic ice mitigation resources/strategies may not be sufficient to attenuate ice jams with today's extreme climate changing weather patterns, resulting in higher intensity spring breakup and possibly higher potential for ice jamming. A consideration needs to be addressed either to proactively prevent Catfish Creek floodwater from entering flood prone areas within Port Bruce or assist the floodwater to easily travel through the affected areas in an effective and efficient manner.

## **Proposal**

A general recommendation from the residents and municipal representatives identified the possibility of a grade realignment for the south end of Lindley Street south of Imperial Road during flood emergencies. This section of road extends into an area where morphological modification would interfere with the Dynamic Beach element of the Conservation Authorities Act for alterations in the area.



Under Section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act "development" is defined as,

- (a) the construction, reconstruction, erection or placing of a building or structure of any kind,
- (b) any change to a building or structure that would have the effect of altering the use or potential use of the building or structure, increasing the size of the building or structure or increasing the number of dwelling units in the building or structure,
- (c) site grading, or
- (d) the temporary or permanent placing, dumping or removal of any material, originating on the site or elsewhere; ("aménagement")

Under this proposal, material would have to be temporarily removed and grading would have to occur, which is in contravention of Section 28, subsection 25.

Ontario Regulation 146/06, Catfish Creek Conservation Authority: Regulation of Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses, states that the Authority may grant permission for development in or on the areas described in subsection 2 (1) if, in its opinion, the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches, pollution or the conservation of land will not be affected by the development.

At this information phase of the optional flood mitigation strategy for this area of Port Bruce, it is the opinion of the CCCA that the Dynamic Beach Hazard would be affected. Due to the erodibility of the local parent soils, there is a high probability for erosion of the shoreline to occur in the area of the proposed development. Consequently, with the present project suggestion and in the interests of liability and risk, the CCCA would not be able to support the construction of a relief structure through the dynamic beach area until further investigation and analysis is completed. However, under critical flood circumstances (road inundation approaching Lindley Street and Imperial Road elevation) and under the direction of the Conservation Authority, CCCA is willing to provide the municipality with temporary backing/support regrading a flood relief initiative at the south end of Lindley Street, south of the Imperial Road intersection. The altered area will require rehabilitation to its original condition, grade and morphology immediately (within 5 days) following the flood event.


The aforementioned temporary flood relief resolution is not to be misinterpreted as a permanent solution for flood mitigation in this area; it is intended as a short-term solution to a long-term problem. CCCA understands the need for this temporary flood relief proposal while a long-term arrangement is confirmed. CCCA recommends a duration of two years (time to be jointly determined) for this planning. As per Section 28 of the Conservation Authority Act work permits are only valid for a maximum of 24 months, (4) A designate under subsection (3) shall not grant a permission for development with a maximum period of validity of more than 24 months.

As discussed during the May 8 meeting with CCCA staff, Malahide Mayor and supporting staff as well as representatives of the Port Bruce Rate Payers Association, the solicitor general may be able to provisionally supersede the idea of "development" under Section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act in this matter under The Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act. Malahide Mayor and staff suggested that the Malahide Municipal Emergency Coordinator would explore this option.

## Strategy


The following suggestions/recommendations regarding the travel of flood waters through Port Bruce in proximity to the community pavilion is intended as the start of discussions with applicable government agencies and relevant local interest groups to mitigate flood water elevations in the above outlined area (see map below).

The CCCA has explored several options to mitigate the flooding of Port Bruce in the area west of the community pavilion.




## CCCA suggestions are as follow:

- Investigate/evaluate and if required repair the catch basin at Colin and Hale Streets to
  prevent the backwater pressure from the Catfish Creek during flood stage. A consensus
  amongst the residents in the area appears to indicate that the catch basin will develop a
  backpressure discharging creek water through the catch basin and contributing to
  flooding of the immediate area during flood events.
- 2. Imperial Road and Lindley Street intersection: Initial investigations indicate this intersection has a higher grade than the adjacent roads and bordering properties thereby restricting floodwater flow from the area north of Imperial Road and east of Lindley Streets from dissipating. Elgin County mapping indicates Lindley Street as being Malahide owned, but does not show the south of Imperial Road portion as even being a road. The recommendation for this intersection is three fold.




 Regrade Imperial Road to allow riverine floodwater flows to continue through to Lake Erie via Lindley Street south.



b) Ditch the east side of Lindley Street, add a culvert under Imperial Road and regrade the intersection to allow floodwaters from the north side of Imperial Road to dissipate through Lindley Street south. If physically possible, ditch both sides of Imperial Road from Colin to Lindley Street to assist directing flood flows through the culvert towards suggestion b's, french drain. This option may be easier to implement as opposed to arranging Elgin County to regrade the intersection.

c) The flow modifications at the intersection of Imperial Road and Lindley Street (south of Imperial Road) are required to convey the water through a conduit i.e. french drain designed by a Water Resources/Coastal Engineer who understands coastal processes, wave uprush and storm surges.

The engineers report/design would be required to addresses specific elements of the Board approved CCCA Shoreline management Plan, *Impact of Structures on Coastal Processes, Shoreline Management Plan*, Catfish Creek Conservation Authority, Philpott Associates Coastal Engineers, April 1991, as outlined below;

"If protection of a segment of shoreline is to be permitted, then the protection must be designed to minimize its impact on adjacent and down drift shorelines. Impacts to be considered are, local impacts associated with altered nearshore wave or current patterns.

Property owners will be required to submit an impact statement to the conservation authority. With respect to the impact of structures on coastal processes the property owner's local impact assessment should be required to demonstrate three key items:

- 1. That there will be no increase in the long term erosion rate on neighbouring properties caused by the proposed structure.
- 2. That the proposed structure will not cause damage to adjacent structures.
- 3. That the proposed structure will in no way have any detrimental effects on the environment.

Local impacts will generally be experienced +/- 5 times the length of the proposed structure. This report is required from a coastal engineer for the structures, conduits or modifications to the dynamic beach.

5 .Promote sediment accumulation and grass planting.

A suggestion is to petition the structure as a Municipal Drain thereby allowing the municipality jurisdiction.

#### **Petition Drains**

#### Petition

- 4 (1) A petition for the drainage by means of a drainage works of an area requiring drainage as described in the petition may be filed with the clerk of the local municipality in which the area is situate by,
- (a) the majority in number of the owners, as shown by the last revised assessment roll of lands in the area, including the owners of any roads in the area;
- (b) the owner or owners, as shown by the last revised assessment roll, of lands in the area representing at least 60 per cent of the hectares in the area;
- (c) where a drainage works is required for a road or part thereof, the engineer, road superintendent or person having jurisdiction over such road or part, despite subsection 61 (5);
- (d) where a drainage works is required for the drainage of lands used for agricultural purposes, the Director. R.S.O. 1990, c. D.17, s. 4 (1).

All of the above outlined suggestions will require field appropriate engineer approved structures, conduits or modifications.

CCCA is open to remedial proposals from Malahide Township. Such proposals are required to:

- 1) Address components of the CCCA Shoreline management Plan, *Impact of Structures on Coastal Processes, Shoreline Management Plan*, Catfish Creek Conservation Authority, Philpott Associates Coastal Engineers, April 1991.
- 2) Be designed by a Water Resources/Coastal Engineer who understands coastal processes, wave uprush and storm surges.
- 3) Reviewed by CCCA Staff for compliance.
- 4) Approval by the CCCA Board.

It is the recommendation of the Catfish Creek Conservation Authority that this information requires immediate attention as the suggested two year temporary Lindley Street South floodwater relief proposal window allowance is critical.

- Compiled answers in conjunction with staff for a meeting with the Port Bruce rate Payers and

- Assisted in the OPC Path of Honor workday. Staff from OPC, students and instructors in conjunction with CCCA staff planted 15 large stock Sycamore Trees and 5 Medium stock Tulip trees in Memorial of fallen officers across the Province.

## RE: Request for authorization of a proposed change in use and disposition of Ecological Gift ON930

Dear Mr. Underhill,

I am writing in response to your May 15, 2023 request for authorization of a proposed change in use of Ecological Gift ON930, a fee simple gift donated by Windon Farms Limited in December 2022 and certified as an Ecological Gift on May 3, 2023. The proposed activities involve restoring the agricultural field on Ecological Gift ON930 to a native tall grass prairie community.

Under the Ecological Gifts Program (EGP), recipients are responsible for the long-term management and conservation of Ecological Gifts and their ecologically sensitive features. To provide a safeguard, if an unauthorized change in use or disposition occurs, recipients are subject to a federal tax under the provisions of section 207.31 of the *Income Tax Act*.

For ECCC, the primary consideration when assessing a proposed disposition and/or change in use of an Ecological Gift is whether the ecologically sensitive features for which the property was certified will receive the same or higher level of protection. Before authorizing a disposition and/or change in use of an Ecological Gift, ECCC must be satisfied that:

- the proposed disposition or change in use will result in protection that is at least equal to or better than that provided for under the existing arrangement;
- the proposed disposition or change in use is beneficial to the long-term conservation and management of the ecologically sensitive features on the subject land:
- in the case of a proposed disposition, the intended new recipient of the ecological gift of land or eligible interest or right in land is qualified to receive an ecological gift under the criteria of the EGP and has the capacity to manage the property so as to ensure and maintain its long-term ecological integrity;
- in the case of an eligible interest or right in land, the new or amended conservation easement, covenant or real servitude is: a) consistent with the original purpose, and b) registered at least at the same level of priority as the original; and
- the disposition or change in use is within the control of the recipient of the Ecological Gift.

ECCC has reviewed the proposed activity to restore 6.88 ha of agricultural field into a tall grass prairie community. Given that the tall grass prairie restoration would increase the overall ecological value of the property, including improving habitat for wildlife and species at risk, ECCC authorizes this change in use for Ecological Gift ON930. It is recognized that without these restoration activities, the agricultural field would be abandoned and non-native species would likely colonize the fields and reduce ecological potential of the property.

This authorization is being granted under the provisions that the activities will be undertaken as proposed in the May 15, 2023 request for the change in use. Prior to these activities taking place, all necessary permits and permissions must be in place. Should there be any changes to the implementation timing or proposed activities, please advise the Ontario Regional Ecological Gifts Coordinator.

Following the restoration activities, it is expected that CCCA will conduct site monitoring visits to ensure restoration efforts are successful and provide the EGP with updates of any concerning monitoring results.

Under section 207.31 of the *Income Tax Act*, any changes in use or dispositions of Ecological Gifts that are not authorized by the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Canada are subject to a tax. Please note that this authorization is null and void if there is a material change to the proposed activities. New change in use or disposition applications are to be requested separately.
